Airport ground transportation market is expected to reach US\$ 22 billion in 2022

The airports are the most common type of transportation medium for international travelers and tourists. An airport can have multiple terminals, and aircrafts are assigned specific terminal for landing. The terminal and main airport building can be far, and passengers cannot walk to the aircrafts from building and other way around with luggage.

To make the transfer of passenger and luggage from building and aircraft, there are several vehicles, scheduled according to the flights or can be booked by passengers according to their convenience.

This airport ground transportation is sometimes organized by airline, as a service included along with flight. Uber Wants Cheaper EVs Made Just For Ride-Sharing

Uber is doing everything it can to make an entire fleet of electric ride-sharing vehicles by 2030. Uber has already taken a step in that direction, by working a deal with Hertz to allow drivers to rent its electric vehicles. Another avenue the ride-sharing company is considering is having a dedicated electric vehicle made exclusively for ride-sharing, per a report from the Wall Street Journal.

Uber CEO Dara Khosrowshahi recently spoke at an event hosted by WSJ, saying the company is working with automakers on developing EVs designed with features just for ride-sharing. These include features like lower top speeds, which Khosrowshahi says are of better use in city environments. "I do think that top speeds, for example, that many cars have are not necessary for city driving that's associated with ride-share. That can reduce the specs and if you reduce the specs you can reduce the ultimate cost." Khosrowshahi also highlighted other customer-friendly features, like conversational seating that faces each other.

Why some airports use buses to transport passengers to planes

Watching your flight take off without you is a sobering experience, but that's what happened to 55 passengers on a shuttle bus heading across the tarmac to their aircraft when it started moving across the tarmac at India's Bengaluru Airport.

"Why aren't you on board?" messaged a passenger on the Delhi-bound aircraft to Neeraj Bhat, his friend on the bus, but there was nothing to be done. The airline operating the flight, Go First, apologised profusely, booked passengers on a following flight, stood down the staff responsible and offered a free flight on the airline's domestic network to affected passengers but Bhat wasn't biting.

"Maybe they should rename the airline 'Go Now'", he said.

Have you ever had a flight that began with a bus ride to the plane? Probably not in Australia, here passengers usually board their aircraft via an airbridge, or a short walk across the tarmac for rearboarding on stairs, but at European airports shuttle buses between terminal and aircraft are common.

Bus company offering more trips to Logan airport from Mansfield commuter rail station The Sun Chronicle - Jan. 23, 2023

MANSFIELD — A bus company that offers express service from the MBTA commuter rail station to and from Logan International Airport in Boston is offering more daily trips.

<u>Blue Apple Bus Co.</u> started making 15 daily round trips on Saturday, up from 10 trips, John Cogliano, president and CEO of the Randolph-based company, said.

The company started the service from the MBTA station in November, the first time buses have made trips to Logan since Bonanza Bus pulled out of Foxboro at least 20 years ago.

State Dept. warns Cancún visitors against Ubers as taxis protest

The U.S. Embassy and Consulates in Mexico on Monday issued a <u>security alert</u> for the state of Quintana Roo — home to Cancún, the Riviera Maya and Tulum — warning that hiring application-based car services such as Uber and Cabify could put passengers at risk of getting caught in a tense exchange between drivers competing for fares.

While the State Department has said transportation apps "generally offer another safe alternative to taxis," <u>recent disputes</u> between drivers for the apps and taxi unions "have occasionally turned violent, resulting in injuries to U.S. citizens in some instances," the alert read.

The travel alert came as the region's licensed taxi drivers have been protesting by blocking the road to Cancun's hotel zone, leading to <u>tourists abandoning rides to walk to the airport</u> or get escorted by police, La Jornada newspaper reported.

Proposed Chicago ordinance would hike fees for O'Hare ride-share trips

A proposed Chicago ordinance would mean more expensive Uber and Lyft trips for suburban riders making trips to and from O'Hare International Airport or other parts of the city.

The ordinance creating a new 10-cent fee per ride was introduced Wednesday by Alderman Susan Sadowski Garza and referred to the city council's Committee on License and Consumer Protection.

The fee would fund a Network Worker Resolution Center, a nonprofit organization that would connect ride-share and food delivery drivers with representation in grievances, as well as provide them with outreach and education services.

The measure also would create an appeal and arbitration process for drivers who perform at least 10% of their business in the city and believe they've been unjustly deactivated by a ride-share or food delivery company.

<u>Hertz is bringing thousands of EVs and chargers to the city of Denver in a broad new</u> partnership

<u>Hertz</u> is teaming up with the city of Denver — and soon, it hopes, with other cities — to build out its charging infrastructure to support the ongoing transition to electric vehicles.

The partnership is a big step toward helping rental car drivers, including those who may be renting an EV for the first time or in an unfamiliar area, to navigate the often-daunting task of finding a charge. It'll also see Denver boost availability and education around EVs in a first-of-its-kind effort.

As part of the program, called "Hertz Electrifies," the rental car company plans to add more than 5,000 EVs to its Denver fleet for daily customers as well as for ongoing rentals to drivers for ridesharing services like Uber. To support those who rent the EVs, Hertz and its partner BP Pulse, the EV-charging network owned by oil giant BP, will also install public EV chargers at Denver International Airport and at sites around the city, with a focus on underserved communities.

That latter point is key to the deal. In addition to building chargers in lower-income neighborhoods, Hertz will provide EVs, tools and training to the city's technical high school — and will offer summer job opportunities through Denver's Youth Employment Program.

Arlington's Via Rideshare expands transit services in Tarrant County

ARLINGTON, Texas – The City of Arlington is expanding its on-demand public transit service to make it easier for people to get to other parts of North Texas.

Via Rideshare will now pick up and drop off riders at several Trinity Metro bus stops in Fort Worth.

The expanded service marks the city's continued commitment to the unique public transit option. At the end of 2022, the Arlington City Council voted unanimously to continue its partnership with Via for at least another two years.

Since the City of Arlington replaced its traditional downtown bus line with Via in 2017, the service has been steadily growing.

"We've given over 1.6 million rides," said Ann Foss, the planning & programming manager for the City of Arlington's Transportation Department. "We continue to see hundreds of new rides trying the service each week, so we really do believe that the service is fulfilling a need and there's a lot of interest for it as well."

Little tech luxuries once made middle class millennials feel rich. That era is over

Growing up in the 2000s and 2010s, big tech made some big promises: Everything would be disrupted, streamlined, simplified. We'd be able to hack our lives to perfection, and doing so would make everything cheaper, to boot.

For a while, the promises seemed to pan out. At least in certain sectors. Travel—flights, accommodations, transportation—was democratized, with more people able to afford to go to more places and post the photos to prove it on Instagram. Food from local restaurants and grocery stores could be delivered for free right to your front door. Licencing system fueling taxi shortage - Uber Ireland

During the pandemic, <u>many taxi drivers quit the industry</u> and when restrictions loosened decided not to return. Even prior to COVID-19, the industry was slowly contracting and Mr Harte says Uber is often contacted by people who are put off by what it takes to get a licence.

"The biggest challenge for them is they are not able to licence the vehicle that they currently own," he told Newstalk Breakfast.

"To get a new vehicle licence, it needs to be a very specific make and model by the NTA and it's been like that for 10 years."

Others find the amount of training they are required to go through off-putting.

"Many drivers tell us they're just not prepared to do the six months training to memorise every street and landmark in their local area." Mr Harte said.

Last month, Fine Gael's Neale Richmond said the Government has to do more to help the industry.

"I think we are all very grateful for the service they provide and we're happy to pay it but ultimately, we don't have enough taxis in Dublin or across Ireland," he told *Newstalk Breakfast*.

"We don't have enough taxi drivers coming out at the times that are a little bit less appealing; we don't have enough taxi drivers servicing the airport and we need collectively to do a lot more to get more taxis out on the street to provide that service."

Car Rental Rates: A Three-Year Analysis

Compared to the "normal" baseline of 2019, each of the chosen car types saw significant gains in 2021 and 2022, the pandemic-exit years. While 2021 followed a normal rate pattern of summer peaks — and a historically high peak at that — 2022 saw sustained high rates in the first half that

deflated slightly moving into fall. One explanation is that supply loosened somewhat as the year progressed, putting downward pressure on rates.

Despite the fact <u>EV prices</u> — for the most part — are falling, renting them hasn't gotten any cheaper than it was before. NOT EASY: Airport Accessibility

While many people are eager to travel, one of the major deterrents from moving from here to there is having to deal with the chaos, confusion, and long distances <u>at airports</u> that challenge even the nimblest and most athletic.

From the need to walk miles from one gate to the next, poor-quality air and dirty and inaccessible toilets, to high-priced food and surly employees, along with an almost total disregard for travelers with disabilities – all are roadblocks to increasing travel frequency. Who to blame? These issues can be placed at the feet of government officials, airport designers, and airport/airline corporate executives.

The Census Bureau estimated that over 42.6 million people in the United States (13 percent), have some type of disability that may impact on their mobility, vision, hearing, or cognition. The Bureau also finds that older adults are more likely to have a disability and the number of seniors is rapidly increasing. On a global level, approximately 1.2 billion people (between 15-20 percent of the world population) live with a disability. By 2050, the number of people aged 60+ y/o will reach approximately 2.1 billion.

'I had no choice': For many homeless people, O'Hare has become a nighttime refuge Chicago Tribune - Jan. 22, 2023

Norbert Pikula, 77, had been sleeping on a friend's sofa every night for the last six months. But when his friend was admitted to the hospital a few weeks ago, Pikula's fragile world turned upside down and he had nowhere to sleep.

So now he uses his senior citizen CTA pass to ride to O'Hare International Airport and spend the night there. His situation mirrors that of countless other homeless people who sleep at the airport to stay warm and safe during the winter.

"I had no choice," Pikula told the Tribune on Thursday. He was on his way to open a bank account after eating his usual weekday lunch at Providence Soup Kitchen in St. Stanislaus Kostka Catholic Church.

According to a report from the Chicago Coalition for the Homeless, <u>an estimated 65,611 people experienced homelessness in Chicago in 2020</u>, an estimate different from that offered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development because it takes into account people living doubled up or temporarily staying with others.

Airport representatives are working with the Sarasota Development Review Committee to rescind its Development of Regional Impact classification and to replace it with a general development plan in order to develop parcels on airport property that lie within the city limits. The airport is seeking a development agreement with the city on 88.84 acres at the southwest corner of its property.

The airport is in three governmental jurisdictions — the city and Sarasota and Manatee counties.

By Florida statute, a development of regional impact is "any development which, because of its character, magnitude or location, would have a substantial effect upon the health, safety or welfare of citizens of more than one county."

<u>Design Approved For New Parking Garage At Jacksonville International Airporte International Airport</u>

Passengers departing Northeastern Florida's Jacksonville International Airport will soon have several thousand additional parking spaces. On Monday, the Jacksonville Aviation Authority board took steps toward constructing a new \$100 million parking garage and expanding the security checkpoints at revenue at <u>Jacksonville International Airport</u> (JAX).

The board voted 6-0 for a \$10 million budget transfer to design a third parking garage to add around 2,000 spaces. The new facility will encompass six levels and sit adjacent to the existing daily garage on what is currently a surface parking lot. The facility is projected to be completed by the fourth quarter of 2024 or the first quarter of 2025.

The meeting also resulted in the board unanimously ratifying a \$15 million award for continued work on the checkpoint renovation at the airport. The upgrades are both parts of an upcoming terminal expansion to add the six-gate Concourse B, expected to be completed in 2025.
